This is an accelerated and blended class/7 week class that will meet from January 23 – March 12, 2023, via ZOOM from 10:00-11:30am EST/US on Mondays. In addition, students will complete a significant amount of work on Blackboard during the rest of the week online. This is considered an accelerated AND blended course, so please expect both in class and online assignments with weekly deadlines. The deadlines for this accelerated/blended course are Wednesdays and Sundays at 11:59pm EST/US each week.

This class will be taught in a **Structured Remote** format, which means that we will hold live classes virtually online according to the schedule above. Your attendance at all virtual meetings is required, just as in an on-campus class, and regular attendance will be a part of your course participation grade. Instructions for accessing virtual class meetings are found on the course Blackboard site.

*PLEASE NOTE: This course does require access to a microphone and a webcam for weekly live ZOOM classes, Flipgrid/Extempore assignments, and testing via EXAMITY. You will need the following equipment and technology specifications for this class:

- ✓ access to reliable internet on a consistent/daily basis
- ✓ access to a computer or tablet with a webcam during the ZOOM sessions
- ✓ access to a computer with a webcam for exams via the EXAMITY proctoring platform.

Textbooks and other resources:

This is a Z-course, which means that the textbook and materials are provided to you at no cost. You will need regular internet access to access and study from the digital textbook, as well as other course materials provided.

Course Description:

Welcome to Spanish 101! This 3-credit course is a beginning language course focusing on the study of Spanish language and culture. Students begin to develop the ability to communicate in Spanish through the consideration of cultural themes, language functions, and authentic situations as they acquire the structures and lexicon to work with written language, conversation, and composition. No prior knowledge of Spanish is required. In-class work is supplemented by 20 hours of online work. (HUMD[M]) Three hours each week. Formerly SN 101.

Course Objectives: Upon completion, the student will be able to:

- 1. Communicate in the target language at an elementary level in the skill areas of reading, writing, speaking, and listening.
- 2. Apply linguistic structures supporting communication at the elementary level of proficiency.
- 3. Express and appropriately employ the following language functions: greetings, leave-takings, requesting information, asking for assistance, giving, and receiving directions, and expressing opinions.
- 4. Discuss Hispanic culture and specific cultural practices at the elementary level by using simple sentences.
- 5. Discuss the relationship between the cultural practices and products under consideration at the elementary level by using simple sentences.
- 6. Exhibit appropriate sociolinguistic behaviors through oral presentations at the elementary level as these correspond to increasing linguistic ability in Spanish.
- 7. Produce and present a cultural project at the elementary level.

Assignments:

Exams: There will be a midterm and a final exam in this course. These exams will consist of the following sections: listening comprehension, grammar, vocabulary, reading, culture, and short compositions. Exams are proctored via *Examity* and are closed book/closed note and timed.

The dates of the exams are stated in the syllabus. *Please see my policy on missed tests at the end of this syllabus*.

Quizzes: There will be five quizzes throughout the semester. These quizzes may include listening comprehension, grammar, and vocabulary. Quizzes are proctored via Examity and are closed book/closed note and timed. *Please note that I do not offer extensions for missed quizzes, but I drop the lowest quiz grade at the end of the semester.*

Homework Checks: Your homework is done through Blackboard and is found at the end of each unit (labeled Homework Check). Each unit offers multiple practice activities followed by a final, cumulative comprehension check. When you complete the comprehension check, you will have five opportunities; Blackboard will record your highest score in the Grade Center on Bb.

Class Participation: Active participation in **ZOOM classes** contributes to your learning and is an important factor in your grade. The instructor will monitor student participation according to the following rubric:

Oral Assignments: You will complete oral communication assessments on the Extempore platform over the course of the semester. Using Extempore, you will record short answers to questions posted on Extempore (https://student.extemporeapp.com/), our recording software. You should complete these assignments using only the grammar and vocabulary you have learned in the course. Evidence that you have gotten outside help, whether from an individual or an electronic translator, will cause you to get a zero for the assignment.

Discussion Board Posts (via Flipgrid and Blackboard): You will interact in a discussion board format regularly throughout the course via Flipgrid (https://info.flipgrid.com/) and the Discussion Board on the course Blackboard site. Your posts should use the vocabulary and grammar covered in the course. In the beginning of the class, you will use both English and Spanish in your posts; later, you will use only Spanish. You will be graded using the following rubric:

- 1. You post one original submission.
- 2. You respond to a peer with thoughtful commentary.
- 3. Your submission shows no evidence of electronic translator use, or grammatical structures that are outside the scope of the course. In other words, you create your own sentences with what you have learned in the course!
- 4. Your submission uses appropriate punctuation and capitalization if written, and clear/understandable phrases if spoken.

Composition: Students will complete a composition during the second half of the course. You may use your textbook and class notes to complete this assignment. You may not use any other resources or websites. The rubric used for evaluating your composition is posted on Blackboard. Please note that using grammar outside the scope of the assignment will result in a lower grade.

Cultural Presentation: Students will complete a project that deals with an aspect of Hispanic culture. The presentation will be 3 minutes in length, and students will present **in Spanish** through a narrated PowerPoint or other presentation. The topic for the project must be approved by the professor. This project will require research; students will need to use reliable resources and provide a bibliography of their sources following MLA formatting. Students will present their work through the use of technology, such as PowerPoint or Prezi. No more than one 30 second video clip may be used. Students are responsible for presenting their work to the class on the day indicated in the syllabus. More detailed instructions will be provided by your instructor later in the semester.

Students will have two weekly deadlines for this course: Wednesdays and Sundays at 11:59pm.

Test-taking procedures & standards (Please review!)

As noted in your syllabus, SPAN 101 will have several quizzes, a midterm, and final exam.

- 1. All students are expected to take exams during the time frame listed on the syllabus.

- **2.Proctored Exams/quizzes:** The SPAN 101 exams and quizzes are **proctored using the proctoring service EXAMITY.** Students will register via Examity by providing an ID (University ID or Driver's License) and take a photo to register for use of EXAMITY. The exams are auto proctored, and a **WEBCAM must be on**, and a student must be visible during the exam. Students may use a desktop, laptop, or tablet to complete exams. Access to Google Chrome is required. **Here is a video that walks students through the EXAMITY process.**

NOTE: I do not offer make up quizzes, but I will drop the lowest quiz grade at the end of the semester.

Please note: Exams/quizzes taken without a webcam will be marked as a "0." No exceptions.
