This is a 13 week blended class that will meet from Feb 7, 2023 - May 14, 2023 in person every Tuesday from 11:00am-12:15pm in HS 171 on the Germantown campus. In addition, students will complete a significant amount of work on Blackboard during the rest of the week online. This is considered a blended course, so please expect both in class and online assignments with weekly deadlines on Thursdays (for discussion boards) and Sundays at 11:59pm EST.

\*PLEASE NOTE: This course **does** require access to a microphone and a webcam for Flipgrid/Extempore assignments and testing via EXAMITY. You will need the following equipment and technology specifications for this class:

- ✓ access to reliable internet on a consistent basis
- ✓ access to a computer or tablet with a webcam for exams via the EXAMITY platform
- ✓ access to a webcam/smartphone for video assignments.

\*\*It is important to know up front that this is an *active learner-focused course!* Be prepared to PARTICIPATE in warm-ups, group work, creative writing exercises, mini-presentations, and discussions to gain proficiency in the Spanish language!

\*\*This class is conducted <u>IN SPANISH</u>. I will address the students in Spanish and students are expected to respond as best they can in Spanish. The best way to gain proficiency in another language is to get out of your comfort zone and practice! Do not worry! We will all be learning together with the goal of developing all components of the Spanish language.

#### Textbooks and other resources:

#### **I. Course Description:**

Welcome to Spanish 201! Spanish 201 is an intensive review of basic Spanish grammar directed at building fluency and proficiency in oral and written Spanish. Class work will include practice in oral communication, and tests will include preparation of written compositions. This course has a prerequisite of Spanish 102, two years of high school Spanish, or the equivalent. Please consult the instructor if you have questions about admission to the course. Three semester hours.

# **II. Course Outcomes:** *Upon completion, the student will be able to:*

- 1. Communicate in the target language at an intermediate level in the skill areas of reading, writing, speaking, and listening.
- 2. Apply advanced grammatical structures, such as complex verb forms, that support communication at the intermediate level of proficiency.
- 3. Compose descriptive, narrative, and expository pieces.
- 4. Express and appropriately employ complex language functions in speech and in writing, including the following: a) expressing opinions, b) analyzing oral and written discourse, c) using appropriate language registers at the intermediate level.
- 5. Describe Hispanic culture and specific cultural practices at the intermediate level by using more complex sentences and paragraphs.
- 6. Read and analyze authentic texts, both literary and popular.
- 7. Exhibit appropriate sociolinguistic behaviors through oral presentations as these correspond to increasing linguistic ability in Spanish.
- 8. Produce and present a cultural project at the intermediate level.

## **III. Class Requirements**

<u>Arriving to class on time/preparation.</u> Our in person classes will begin promptly at the time indicated on the syllabus. Students are expected to arrive on time with a computer or tablet that allow for access to the ACCESO and Blackboard sites during class.

<u>Speaking in the target language</u>. A student is expected to come to class sessions ready to use his/her/their conversational skills in Spanish. Don't worry! Everyone in the class is in the process of developing language skills. Your skills will improve with practice.

Completion of assignments by the deadlines of Thursdays (for discussion boards) and Sundays at 11:59pm. As this is blended course, there will be significant work outside of our class time. Please review the course schedule for a breakdown of the assignments. Late submissions are not accepted except for extenuating circumstances.

<u>Use of EXAMITY for Exams</u>: students are required to complete SPAN 201 exams via the EXAMITY proctoring platform. This requires access to a webcam for testing.

### IV. Assignments

<u>Small group presentations:</u> students will work in pairs to lead a discussion on a specific cultural segment of a unit. The list of topics/dates will be available the first week of class.

**EXAMS** Students will complete a midterm and final exam in this course. Both exams will be proctored via EXAMITY. The final exam will take place on the exam day set by the College.

<u>Homework</u> Your homework is completed on our Blackboard course site. You may use the multiple websites listed to practice the material before completing the Blackboard exercises for credit. You may make three attempts on each exercise. The gradebook will record your highest score.

<u>Cultural Presentation:</u> Students will have two options for the final presentation: one option is participation in a Global Classrooms project with the University of El Salvador, where the MC student can video chat with a UES student a minimum of 3 times to get a sense of life in El Salvador. The second

involves a more traditional approach of researching a topic of from the professor's list of approved topics. Please see Blackboard for specific details on the requirements on the final presentation.

**Oral exam:** Students will complete a midterm oral exam video recording via Flipgrid.

<u>Discussion Boards (via Flipgrid and Blackboard):</u> You will interact in a discussion board format regularly throughout the course via Flipgrid (<a href="https://info.flipgrid.com/">https://info.flipgrid.com/</a>) and the Discussion Board on the course Blackboard site. Your posts should use the vocabulary and grammar covered in the course. In the first post, you will use both English and Spanish; later, you will use only Spanish. You will be graded using the following **rubric:** 

- 1. You post one original submission.
- 2. You respond to a peer with thoughtful commentary.
- 3. Your submission shows no evidence of electronic translator use, or grammatical structures that are outside the scope of the course.

In other words, you create your own sentences with what you have learned in the course!

4. Your submission uses appropriate punctuation and capitalization if written, and clear/understandable phrases if spoken.

<u>Study Buddy:</u> Students will meet with a fellow classmate/s outside of class for at least **two study sessions** that will be for at least 30 minutes each. The purpose of the study buddy is simple: an effective learning strategy is working with a peer to process and practice the language! Learning a language is not done in isolation!

The professor will assign partners during the first week of class. The session can take place via any virtual platform (google meet, WhatsApp, discord) or in person. Study groups will provide proof of participation with a snapshot of the study session and description via Blackboard.

<u>Cultural Virtual exchange with the University of El Salvador:</u> This semester, students enrolled in SPAN 201 will have opportunity to participate in a virtual class- to class exchange with students and faculty from the **University of El Salvador (UES).** The Global Classroom is a new approach to learning about distinct global perspectives. It brings together geographically distant instructors and students from different lingua-cultural backgrounds to communicate and collaborate through a virtual platform.

By participating in a Global Classroom project, students will increase their global self-awareness and perhaps challenge their own perspectives of other cultures. Please refer to the syllabus and class announcements for more details on when the virtual exchange will take place this semester and how the class will prepare for the session.

## **Test-taking procedures & standards (Please review!)**

As noted in your syllabus, SPAN 201 will have several quizzes, a midterm, and final exam.

# 1. All students are expected to take exams during the day/time frame listed on the syllabus. Extensions will not be given except for extenuating circumstances (military service, hospitalization, unforeseen circumstances, etc.). If a student misses an exam deadline, it is the student's responsibility to contact the professor as soon as possible.

- 2. During test taking via Blackboard: exams are proctored using the proctoring service EXAMITY. Students will register via Examity by providing an ID (University ID or Driver's License) and take a photo to register for use of EXAMITY. The exams are auto-proctored. Students may use a desktop, laptop, or tablet to complete exams. Access to Google Chrome is required. Here is a video that walks students through the EXAMITY process.
- **3. Quizzes for SPAN 201:** These quizzes require students to use and produce several grammatical structures and vocabulary. The quizzes are meant to prepare students for the midterm and final exams.
